- It serves a number of functions, including:

 - Promoting trade and development
 - Providing educational opportunities for youth, particularly for studying abroad
 - Creating a forum for conversation and recognition

- March 28,1983: Sister City relationship established by Reso. 83-13, with unanimous approval from the City Council, Chamber of Commerce and Sister City ad hoc committee
- April 17, 1984: The Mayors of Homer and Teshio sign the Oath to Establish a Sistership Affiliation
- August 9, 2010: Ord. 10-35 appropriates \$9,900 for the 25th anniversary celebration
- August 8, 2016: Reso. 16-080 reconfirms the Sister City relationship
