- Japan's Spring Dyed in Pink -

When it comes to spring in Japan, cherry blossoms are the highlight.

For centuries, they have captivated people with their beauty and are deeply tied to Japanese culture and traditions.

Their natural beauty is not limited to cherry trees, but also integrated into people's daily lives in Japan.

Somei-Yoshino, a well-known variety of cherry tree in Japan, accounts for about 80% of all cherry trees in Japan.

This variety, which has been popular since the Edo period, is one that cannot produce viable seeds; so to reproduce, it requires human help, and since the Meiji period, the number of trees has been increased using grafting and cutting, which are techniques for "cloning" those individual trees with the best genes in order to preserve their excellent characteristics. Isn't it romantic to think that the Somei-Yoshino you see are the same ones that people saw in the distant past?



Generation after generation, era after era, you can see how much Japanese people have loved cherry blossoms in the traditional colors and food of Japan.

Japanese Traditional Colors

Did you know that there are colors in Japan that have been named and loved in the context of Japan's unique culture, traditions and seasonal changes? The color "Sakura," known



as cherry blossom pink in English, is one of the traditional colors associated with Japanese seasons and is representative of spring.

It is a pale pink that first became popular in the Heian period, and it shows that the Japanese have loved cherry blossoms since ancient times.

These dango are made with three colors of dumpling dough: pink, white and green, and have been loved since the Edo period.

They are also called "Hanami dango" (cherry blossom viewing dango), and sometimes the three colors of pink, brown and green are used to match the cherry blossom trees. They have the sort of simplistic sweetness that doesn't require using any sauce or bean-jam you might find on other forms of dango.

Spring in Japan, when both nature and the city are dyed pink, is a great season for anyone planning a trip to Japan.
